

### A Note from the Principal Colleen Werner



As the weather turns cold there are many issues we begin to think about. One is energy conservation. The district has been implementing a new energy savings plan that has resulted in Robert Frost having a 12.12% cost avoidance this past year. This translates to a \$7,853.45 savings. Our building ranked 30th out of 36 buildings in the district. Thanks to the combine efforts of our teachers, custodians, and other staff we are receiving \$587 dollars in our building supply budget. We will continue to make every effort to conserve energy and be good stewards of our tax payers' dollars and work hard to receive even bigger incentives next year. I am certain that the new heating system that was installed this past summer is going to prove to be a big saver.

During cold weather it is easy to fall back into habits of dropping students off in front of the building. Please remember that **students are not to enter the building before the bell has rung** and should be **dropped off on the 40th Street or on the parking lot circle** and come to the playground. Both of these drop-off locations are a much shorter walk to the playground than coming all the way around the building from the front. Remember too, that dropping your child off in **the middle of the road can result in \$100 fine**. The Sioux Falls Police have received complaints of parents dropping kids off in the middle of the road and are patrolling the schools before and after school. Please take the time to approach the school from the

appropriate direction or pull over and have your children walk to a corner with Safety Patrol to cross. We need to keep our children safe.

This past week the temperatures have dropped down to the teens with the wind chill. Be sure to send your children with the needed winter wear for weather. In South Dakota, the weather can change drastically in a matter of an hour. Remember, students go out for recess unless the temperature is below zero. After Thanksgiving break we will have flags in the entry ways that you can reference when you drop you child off in the morning. If the flag in



the window is green, the students stay out on our playground. If the flag is red, students come directly into the building. You may also note that if the temperature is below zero, our Safety Patrols will not be out on their corners either.

Winter weather is just ahead. Together we can keep our children warm and safe during this winter season.

### District "Fights" Bullying with Prevention Program

On the playground. At city parks. In the backyard of the kid next door. Wherever children gather, so too do bullies. They've been there since the beginning of time. But never before have schools taken such a strong stand against the damaging physical and emotional behavior that is today defined as "bullying." I'm proud to say the Sioux Falls School District is

Falls School District is leading the way in our region in terms of bullying

prevention efforts. Despite funding challenges that forced painful cuts last spring, the School Board held firm on its commitment to implement the Olweus Bullying Prevention Program in grades K-8 this fall. Implementation at the high schools will happen in subsequent years.

This fall, teachers and administrators in every elementary and middle school are undergoing intense training with an ultimate goal of reducing the number of bullying incidents reported in their schools. Students in all elementary and middle school buildings have completed a pre-test survey to determine in what ways they have been bullied or witnessed bullying in the past. Teachers then utilize classroom meetings and PRO-Time to further inform students of the proactive role they can play in stopping bullying behavior. A posttest later in the year will help the District determine what impact prevention efforts are making. This is not to say that the implementation of the Olweus Program is the District's first attempt at eradicating



bullying behaviors. Through the District's Progressive Discipline Policy, we have always taken a no-tolerance approach to name-calling, physical harm, threats, avoidance and any other form of bullying. We will continue to do so. What the Olweus Program gives students and teachers is a common language that will empower witnesses of bullying to seek help from a trusted adult who is trained to resolve the situation. The Olweus Bullying Prevention Program is the result of decades of research by Dr. Dan Olweus, a professor of psychology from Norway who is often considered the pioneer" in bullying research. The proven Olweus model requires the involvement of individuals, classrooms, the entire school, as well as parents and communities, if bullying is to be addressed successfully. I hope we can count on your support and ask you to partner with our teachers and administrators as the Sioux Falls Public Schools take a strong stand against bullying. Teaching students to celebrate themselves and respect the differences of others are lessons one can never out-grow - they are good for life.


We will be hiring a teacher to fill this third grade position the second half of the year. As always, a committee will be formed and a field of candidates will be interviewed for the position.

## Robert Frost Jump Rope Challenge -SUCCESS



On October 5th, Robert Frost Elementary in Sioux Falls, SD hosted Mark Rosthstein's World of Rope Jumping assembly for all students. He spent the morning with an all school assembly and then spent time with each grade individually.

### School Related Cancellations and Postponements

It is important to be prepared for the winter storms and extreme cold that every South Dakota winter brings. Please read the following information so you are aware of the procedures for school related cancellations and postponements.

We rely on experts from the weather service and city/county officials when we make decisions on school cancellations, late starts or early dismissals.

#### Cancelling School/Late Start

When a severe storm hits the area, or is forecast, we start contacting local officials as early as 3:00 a.m. We communicate with our Operational Services Department, the Weather Bureau, the City Street Department, Sioux Falls Transit, and our transportation contractors. It is our goal to decide whether or not to cancel school by 5 a.m. to allow time for parking lots and sidewalks to be cleared, food services to prepare meals and the bus company to begin operations. In the event that school needs to be cancelled or delayed, families will be alerted via an *Alert Now phone call*. These calls will generally be sent between the hours of 6 a.m. and 6:30 a.m. to accommodate families whose children are picked up by busses at 6:45 a.m. Announcements are also made on KLRN-TV (Cable Channel 20) and over the local radio and television stations.

Because the public schools have a limited rural area, it is often possible for Sioux Falls to have school when nearby towns may not.

#### Early Dismissal

Storms occasionally move in during the day, making it necessary to assess whether or not to dismiss school early. We choose early dismissal only under the most extreme circumstances. In most cases, it is safer for students to remain at school due to the need for transportation and proper supervision. In the rare instances when schools are dismissed early, families will receive a **Connect Ed phone call** and the information will appear on the District's website at <u>www.sf.k12.sd.us</u>. Announcements are also made on KLRN-TV and over the local radio and television stations.

Notifications refer to dismissal "one hour early" or "two hours early" because of the number of different building schedules. In addition to noting the early dismissal, announcements about evening activities are normally included.

It is very important that every **family has a plan for early dismissal**. Be sure your student knows where to go in case no one is at home. Talk to your student about his/her safety during winter weather emergencies.

#### Be safe this winter

The school system offers these suggestions concerning cold weather and emergency situations:

1. Listen for an **Alert Now phone call** regarding school closings, late starts, or early dismissals. Check the District's website at <u>www.sf.k12.sd.us</u> for updated information. Announcements will also be made on KLRN-TV and local radio and television stations. (Please avoid calling schools or the Instructional Planning Center. Phone lines are needed for emergency communications.)

2. Make sure students are **properly dressed** for predicted weather conditions so they are prepared for walking or waiting for a bus in the cold or for being delayed on a bus in a weather-related situation.

3. Students should not **arrive at school** until the scheduled time for outdoor staff supervision or the breakfast program begins.

4. Have a **plan of action** as to where your student will go if school is dismissed early.

5. School officials will use their best judgment about school closings, late starts, or early dismissals, but please remember that a **parent has the right** to keep children home or to pick them up from school early if they feel weather conditions require this action.

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





# LUNCHTIME LESSONS

When is the last time you ate school breakfast or lunch with your child? If it's been a few years, consider this your personal invitation to try it again.

School food has been a perennial target among students, parents and the media. Perhaps those complaints were warranted in the past, but did you know that all food served in school cafeterias today must meet high health standards set by the federal government? The U.S. Department of Agriculture sets strict guidelines as to the fat, protein and sugar content of each meal served as part of the National School Lunch Program.

The Child Nutrition Staff of the Sioux Falls School District takes those guidelines seriously. So seriously, in fact, that the USDA has recognized our commitment and awarded the elementary schools in the District the "HealthierUS School Challenge Bronze Award." This award was established in 2004 and is given to districts that have created healthier school environments through promotion of nutrition and physical activity.

The award means that representatives from the USDA will visit our District soon to congratulate all 24 of our elementary schools for improved menu choices. Only two other schools in South Dakota have received this recognition. Child Nutrition Supervisor Joni Davis has been invited to the White House to meet with First Lady Michelle Obama to discuss the important role schools play in raising healthier children. Because we believe in satisfying our customers — our students — the food service staff goes above and beyond to

accommodate their wishes. They hold focus groups to ask students what they'd like to see on the menu and even allow them to taste-test products they are considering before placing them on the menu. It is your child's classmates who are ultimately choosing what is served in the lunch line each day.



While the federal guidelines won't allow us to serve the deepfat fried foods kids have grown to love, the positive change is that we are helping our students learn to love the healthier options like fresh fruits and vegetables.

We are committed to winning the battle and reducing childhood obesity. In fact, data from the SD Departments of Health and Education prove we are moving in the right direction. In 2008-09, 16.5% of Minnehaha County students were overweight and 15.5%

were obese for a combined total of 32% of students overweight/obese. Data from 2010-11 shows 14.7% students in Minnehaha County are overweight and 13.2% are obese for a total of 27.9% of students overweight/obese. There is still work to do, but we are making a difference. Our schools value the partnership we share with parents and guardians in educating your child and we ask for your support. Encourage your child to eat the healthy breakfast or lunch provided in the school cafeteria. Better yet, set an example and join them for a healthy meal!
